Practicing New Naturalism: Site-Specific Plantings in Public and Private Places

In recent years, the shift towards ecologically driven landscapes has created new opportunities and challenges, often accompanied by big questions for how we do business and engage with our audiences. How do we sell customers and stakeholders on wilder landscapes? How do we shift the narrative of the landscape design and build professions from construction and maintenance to cultivation and stewardship? How do we cultivate new practices and knowledge that can transform our industry's relevance and purpose? Join planting designer, artist and thought leader Kelly Norris for this vibrant exploration of recent and future work at the intersections of horticulture and ecology. His presentation will emphasize the pitch for each commission and the relative success or progress of each project to date with a preview of new developments in the seasons ahead.

Kelly D. Norris is one of the leading horticulturists of his generation. In his practice he explores the intersections of people, plants and place through ecological, site-specific design and art. An award-winning author and plantsman, Kelly's work in gardens has been featured in The New York Times, Better Homes and Gardens, Martha Stewart Living, Fine Gardening, Garden Design and in numerous television, radio and digital media appearances. His most recent book New Naturalism:

Designing and Planting a Resilient, Ecologically Vibrant Home Garden, was named one of the Top 10 Books of 2021 by the American Horticultural Society.

Remediating circling roots when planting container-grown trees: Slicing and shaving and bare-rooting, oh my!

Container-grown trees are a popular option for arborists and landscapers. However, growing trees in standard plastic nursery containers can lead to malformed root systems, namely circling roots. Over the years, several techniques have been promoted to remediate circling roots, such as slicing, teasing, shaving, and barerooting. In this session, Riley will discuss results from over a decade's worth of trials at Michigan State University that compared techniques for remediating circling roots of container-grown trees.

Riley Johnson is an ISA Certified Arborist with Tree Risk Assessment Qualification and a research technician in the Department of Horticulture at Michigan State University. She earned her B.S. in Natural Resources Management from Grand Valley State University and M.S. in Horticulture from Michigan State. In her current role, she works with Dr. Bert Cregg to conduct field research and extension efforts related to landscape tree establishment and Christmas tree production.

Mardi is a North Carolina Certified Plant Professional, a former licensed clinical social worker, and a former North Carolina Licensed Landscape Contractor. She has received Gold and Bronze Awards in Residential Design from APLD, where she served as Virtual Chapter President.



Mixed Bag of Bugs

Insect can be friend or foe, depending on the location, population, and situation. In this session, Jody will provide updates and information about arthropods in the landscape particularly, Emerald ash borer, spotted lanternfly, annual evergreen pests, and then discuss how we can support beneficial insects.

Jody Green is an Extension Educator for Nebraska Extension in Douglas-Sarpy Counties, located in Omaha, NE. She earned her master's and Ph.D. in Entomology from Purdue University. Her primary focus is developing educational programs related to arthropod pests in urban landscapes, while protecting and conserving beneficial organisms and the environment. Jody is active on social media platforms such as Twitter and TikTok, cohosts a podcast called Arthro-pod, and is a regular panelist on "Backyard Farmer."

Organize your business: The things no one tells you when you start a company

Scott will be discussing the steps you need to take to think and act like a business owner instead of simply owning your job. Strategies will include determining roles in the company, how/when to hire, how business taxes work and pitfalls to avoid, budgeting for the year you want to have and creating systems and processes to streamline your company.

Scott Scearcy is a Financial Advisor with Thrivent Financial. For 19 years Scott was the owner and Production Manager of a Landscaping company called CM's A Cut Above in Omaha, Nebraska. He started his company because he wanted the freedom of working for himself and enjoyed being outdoors. As his company grew, Scott realized that he needed to know things that were outside of not only his skillset, but his interests as well. Most of what he knows about running a landscape company was learned the hard way! Ultimately Scott decided to become a Financial Advisor in 2016 with the goal of providing financial and business education and strategies for "regular folks" like himself.
